



My umpiring began in a youth Church league back in 1982, when I was twelve years old. In my second year of college, I felt ready to try high school baseball and registered with MSHSAA. After two high school seasons, I joined a friend and went to the International Umpires Camp in Atlanta. Soon, I discovered I have much more to learn. In 1992, I joined the GSLAU and realized that decision was right. I am proud to be a member of this wonderful organization. The great members we had and still have trained me to become a better umpire. About my sixth year, I worked my way up the GSLAU and was given the chance to work Junior College (JUCO) baseball, including Regional and Super-Regional Games. We continue to send many qualified umpires to work well at this level. At recent meetings, things have been said that imply our association is inferior. I disagree. With our roster decreasing, getting additional umpires to supplement our college schedules is sometimes needed. However, I do not feel we need outside help to replace our umpires to cover these games.

When I started, we were required to go to base and plate mechanics meetings each of our first three years. Our assignor and many of our college-level umpires, some who worked Division I college baseball, trained us well. Now MSHSAA is making that training mandatory. Furthermore, our Training Committee supplements our training with indoor pitching machine clinics, base umpire clinics, and rules clinics. We have a former MLB umpire and the Division II College Midwest Regional Umpire Coordinator to evaluate us and help us keep up with the times. As a high school and JUCO assigning organization, I feel we are superior to umpire groups throughout our region and beyond.

To help us grow, we need to get umpires of all ages, but especially younger candidates. Getting new umpires in a crucial problem throughout the country. Our Recruiting Committee is working hard by contacting those who inquire on our website. During the proper situations, I sometimes talk with a player and find out he or she umpires youth leagues. Many of our members work games from many different levels and with many other non-GSLAU members. These are great chances to encourage those who already umpire to move up and join us.

Throughout my past years on the Board of Directors, I have been asked to lead rule discussions at our Annual Meetings and softball meetings as well. Furthermore, I have helped at field clinics and have assisted our past assignors by evaluating at fall JUCO games. If elected I would like to see the board propose the following topics:

- 1. Have meetings before each season with coaches both high school and summer leagues to discuss their concerns and problems if there are any. Explain some of the rules that they might not understand.
- 2. Contact local colleges that offer officiating classes to recruit and explain there is a great opportunity to stay involved in the great games of baseball and softball while making extra money. Once they finish their class they can start umpiring.
- 3. Promote a larger understanding that this is an Umpire Association not just men's baseball, but softball and not just males. Help recruit more females into the softball umpiring Brotherhood. I used the term Brotherhood because that is what our association is.
- 4. Form a mentorship program.



- 5. Possibly institute a community fund raising project where each member might contribute one game fee toward a worthy local cause chosen by the association. This will put our name out in the community so show that we are not just about umpiring the game.
- 6. Publish out minutes of each board meeting for all members, via the website.
- 7. We need to move ahead with today's technology by allowing voting using a the secure way of Google Workspace or whatever form that might be available. By using this method, it allows everyone the chance to make decisions (there are many for whatever reason that never attended the meeting but would like to be kept informed).
- 8. Promote individuals who show talent and help them advance up the umpiring ladder.
- 9. Have a weekly or biweekly chat sessions to discuss rules or plays that might have occurred in your past games.
- 10. Setup some means to help out new umpires maybe give them and new shirt and hat. Have list of used equipment that they might borrow for the season.
- 11. Look into the possibly of hanging a GSLAU banner at every park we serve to recruit new umpires.
- 12. Strive to have everyone's picture in Arbiter. This helps all members.
- 13. TRAINING, TRAINING ,TRAINING IN PERSON ON THE FIELD AND THROUGH ZOOM.
